



History Day in 2019 taught Middle School students how to research and report on their history lessons.

Kent McCauley and Tim Moore presented a program on the Mill.




Visitors from Kalamazoo's Sister City in Japan spent a half day touring the Historic Village in 2019.

Don Wiertella looks over some recent donations. He stands in the **Express** Office where some of the artifacts are stored.






The Historical Society sponsored an Osher Life Long Learning class in 2019. The group toured the Mill and downtown Vicksburg.

Garden Club members sell their wares during the Harvest Festival.








Pumpkin decorating is a big part of the Harvest Festival.

Fundraising for the Pavilion started at Angels Crossing.

• This group organized the first fundraiser to build a pavilion to house Vicksburg's Farmers' Market in 2012. It was a brunch for the community that raised just over \$4,000 to get the ball rolling to construct a pavilion in the Historic Village.
